

Below are a few examples of the types of fonts that are commonly used in publishing. The dotted pink lines show the differences in spacing between similar fonts. If you do not embed your fonts, the output device will use its version of the same-name font. The spacing is subtle, but it could be enough to throw

your layout off. PLEASE ALWAYS EMBED ALL FONTS (even the "Standard or Base 14"). Some fonts become "Identity-H" encoded when a file is exported to PDF. This type of encoding can be problematic. Identity-H encoding can be avoided by printing to postscript and then Distilling.
